CALL TO COMMEMORATION LAW DAY 2022 Embracing a Legacy of Black Legal Excellence

"African-American lawyers have played a unique role in American history. Imbued with respect for the rule of law and the responsibility that such belief engenders, these lawyers have used their legal training not only to become masterful technicians but to force the legal system to live up to its creed: the promise of 'equal justice under law.'"

—Justice Thurgood Marshall Foreword. Emancipation: The Making of the Black Lawyer by J. Clay Smith Jr., University of Pennsylvania Press, 1993.

The legacy of Black legal excellence in America is undeniable. During some of this nation's darkest moments, Black lawyers have been on the front lines in the battle against racial and social injustice. Before and during the Civil War, Black lawyers in the North worked as abolitionists to help free enslaved Blacks in the South. In the post-Reconstruction era, Black lawyers fought for Black Americans' rights to equal citizenship under the Constitution. During the Civil Rights Movement, Black lawyers crafted the legal strategies and litigated the cases that ultimately abolished segregation under the "separate but equal" doctrine. Black lawyers were chief among the community organizers, activists and leaders of the civil rights movement. They were also the law school professors, law school deans and other legal scholars who helped educate, train, mentor and motivate future Black lawyers to become social engineers for justice. Through their advocacy, agitation, activism, resistance, sacrifice and struggle, they birthed a lineage of Black lawyers who set the standard of excellence that we should all aspire to attain.

For many Black American lawyers, the legacy of legal excellence we celebrate on this occasion can be traced back to the resiliency of African ancestors who were enslaved for generations under the laws of this land. Even after emancipation, the formerly enslaved were still denied many of the rights and privileges guaranteed to American citizens by the United States Constitution. This, along with white supremacist and state-sanctioned anti-Black terrorism, Black Codes, Jim Crow, and countless other forms of disenfranchisement and marginalization under the law, makes it almost unthinkable that future generations would eventually rise up to confront these injustices with the force of law. But that is precisely what Black lawyers have done throughout history, and continue to do today.

The legacy of Black legal excellence we celebrate tonight is a legacy of triumph over adversity: breaking barriers, defying odds and overcoming obstacles. History has no shortage of examples of how the law and legal institutions have been instruments of discrimination and oppression. But despite this—to paraphrase Maya Angelou—still we rise.

As Nikole Hannah-Jones observed in her Pulitzer Prize-winning work, The 1619 Project, Black Americans are the only group of people in the history of the United States for whom it was ever against the law to learn to read or write. Today, Black lawyers hold law degrees from some of the most prestigious educational institutions in the country, including the nation's six Historically Black Law Schools. In 1938, U.S. Supreme Court Justice James McReynolds physically turned his back on Charles Hamilton Houston—the esteemed WBA founder and legal giant known as "The Man Who Killed Jim Crow," who was the first General Counsel of the NAACP and Dean of the Howard University School of Law—as he argued a law school integration case. Less than thirty years after Justice McReynolds' insult, Houston's protégé, Thurgood Marshall, had the honor of becoming the first Black U.S. Supreme Court Justice. In 1857, when the Chief Justice of the United States Supreme Court, Roger B. Taney, issued the majority opinion in the Dred Scott case, he reasoned that Black people were "so far inferior that they had no rights which the white man was bound to respect." Last month, we witnessed history as Ketanji Brown Jackson was confirmed as the first Black woman Justice on the U.S. Supreme Court, 165 years after Chief Justice Taney issued his odious opinion. And lest we forget that it

was two Black lawyers who became the first Black President and First Lady of the United States, followed by another Black lawyer who became the first woman and the first person of color to serve as Vice President of the United States. The legacy of Black legal excellence continues.

But we know that the struggle for racial equity, equal rights and equal justice under law also continues. Black political power is still being suppressed in states nationwide through new voting laws and redistricting. We are still litigating the issue of affirmative action in higher education. Meanwhile, the percentage of Black students attending law schools continues to decrease annually. Only about 5% of the lawyers in the United States are Black, and this percentage remains unchanged from 10 years ago. In big law firms, only about 3% of lawyers are Black. Black partners in big law firms account for only 2% of big law partners nationwide, and Black women partners in big law firms represent less than 1% of all partners nationally. Contrary to what many claim, there is an abundance of Black legal talent. But no doubt, institutional, systemic and structural racism, compounded by a variety of racial and other biases, contribute to these abysmal statistics.

We also know that racial disparity is pervasive in the nation's criminal justice system—from the over-policing of Black youth, to the mass incarceration of Black bodies in prisons that profit from their presence, not to mention, a severely flawed reentry process that more often than not leads to recidivism. While recent advances in judicial diversity are a source of hope, we cannot ignore that the nation's courts still do not reflect the racial diversity of the communities they serve. And as we have recently seen, even the most brilliant Black women jurists in America at the highest levels of the judiciary are still considered by some to be "lesser" nominees, as compared to others. The struggle continues.

Bravery, brilliance and boldness are what define the legacy of Black legal excellence. We must be brave enough to speak truth to power. We must be the brilliant voices in the room bringing our diverse experiences and perspectives to the table. We must be bold enough to stand on our principles and advocate for bold changes to the status quo, even in the face of opposition. This year, we honor two brave, brilliant and bold Black women who are part of the legacy we celebrate.

As a retired Partner and the Chief Diversity Officer in a global law firm, Paulette Brown has shown us how Black lawyers can not only survive, but also thrive and effect meaningful change within legal institutions. Paulette has been a longstanding champion of diversity, equity and inclusion (DEI). As President of the National Bar Association and as the first Black woman to serve as President of the American Bar Association (ABA), her bold leadership paved the way for groundbreaking changes in the American legal profession and justice system because of the many DEI initiatives she spearheaded. She also courageously gave voice to the myriad issues that Black lawyers—especially Black women—confront in the legal workplace, particularly in big law firms. Dr. Genna Rae McNeil, Professor Emerita at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill (UNC), is an activist-scholar who has dedicated her career to the study of African American History with an emphasis on race, law and social movements, including the essential role of the Black lawyer in American history. She is the author of the ABA prize-winning biography of Charles Hamilton Houston, Groundwork: Charles Hamilton Houston and the Struggle for Civil Rights, and was the historian of record for amicus curiae briefs filed in the landmark Bakke case. Besides a stellar 36-year career as the first Black tenure-track history professor at UNC, Dr. McNeil also spent significant time as a visiting professor at the Howard University School of Law. Through their respective lives and work, both Paulette Brown and Genna Rae McNeil have exemplified the principles of Houstonian jurisprudence, which makes them both highly deserving of the Charles Hamilton Houston Medallion of Merit.

The legacy of Black legal excellence we embrace and celebrate this Law Day was built by trailblazing Black lawyers who mounted direct challenges to racial injustice through legal advocacy and paved the way for those of us who follow in their footsteps. Their vision and courage must serve as our inspiration, as we continue the fight. We must embrace the legacy left to us by our predecessors in the law and keep it alive for the generations of Black lawyers yet to come. We embrace our legacy of Black legal excellence because we know it will serve as a guide for charting our illustrious future.

THE CHARLES HAMILTON HOUSTON MEDALLION OF MERIT

he Houston Medallion of Merit is presented in honor of Charles Hamilton Houston, one of the founders of the Washington Bar Association. Houston was born in Washington, D.C. in 1895. He attended public schools in Washington, D.C. and after graduating from M Street High School, he attended Amherst College in Amherst, Massachusetts. At Amherst, Houston was elected to *Phi Beta Kappa*. Houston graduated from Amherst in 1915 and later served as an officer in World War I.

In 1919, Houston entered Harvard Law School. He graduated from Harvard in 1922, after serving as the first Black member of the Harvard Law Review. After his graduation from law school, Houston studied international law in Spain for one year and later returned to Washington, D.C. to practice law with his father.

Houston was later appointed Vice Dean of Howard Law School. His efforts transformed Howard from a small, unaccredited night school to a fully-accredited institution which served as the law school for a generation of civil rights lawyers. Working with protégés such as Thurgood Marshall and Spottswood Robinson, Houston developed the strategy to use law and litigation to effectuate social change.

Houston amplified his efforts during his tenure as General Counsel to the NAACP. He first challenged the separate but equal doctrine by demonstrating that educational facilities for Black students were, in fact, far inferior to the facilities provided for white students. After years of litigation in several states, the Supreme Court ultimately discarded the separate but equal myth by holding in *Brown v. Board of Education*, that racial segregation in public schools is, by definition, unequal and therefore, violated the Constitutional guarantee of equal protection under the law. Charles Hamilton Houston died in 1950, four years prior to the issuance of the *Brown* decision.

The Washington Bar Association established the tradition of awarding the Houston Medallion of Merit in 1975. The award is presented annually to an individual who demonstrates a commitment to Charles Hamilton Houston's ideals and jurisprudence:

- ▼ A jurisprudence which observes and recognizes law as an organism for social justice through social engineering;
- ▼ A jurisprudence which espouses and demands scholarship, discipline, perseverance, vigilance and dedication in the totality of the legal, social and governmental framework;
- ▼ A jurisprudence which impels and challenges man to leadership and service for the betterment of the human race; and
- ▼ A jurisprudence which serves and operates through the instrumentality of law to disrobe and destroy the many perceived encumbrances and trappings of birth, origin, color, creed, or religion.

It is in the character and measure of Houstonian Jurisprudence that a recipient of the Medallion of Merit must stand.

aulette Brown is the first woman of color to lead the American Bar Association (ABA), as its president in its history. As the leader of this 400,000 voluntary member organization, Brown was responsible for governance, advocacy and serving as the voice and face of the ABA. Her presidential initiatives, through her Diversity & Inclusion 360 Commission, resulted in an unprecedented number of policies developed and approved by the ABA, having a long-lasting impact on diversity and inclusion in the legal profession and the justice system. Brown also made history by simultaneously serving as the first person of color to Chair the Labor & Employment Section of the New Jersey State Bar Association.

Brown is a past president of the National Bar Association (NBA). Brown and a retired Partner and Chief Diversity & Inclusion Officer at an AmLaw law firm. She Chairs the Board of the New Jersey Institute of Social Justice and is nationally recognized for her dedication and efforts relating to diversity, equity & inclusion, including the impact of implicit bias and is a frequent speaker and educator on both. Since the onset of the COVID-19 Pandemic and the murder of George Floyd, she was called upon to speak as a keynote or as a panelist more than 200 times. Brown is the co-author of two ground-breaking Reports, "Visible Invisibility: Women of Color in Law Firms" and "Left Out and Left Behind: The Hurdles, Hassles and Heartaches of Achieving Long-Term Legal Careers for Women of Color." She has also authored several articles relating to diversity, equity and inclusion.

Brown is a graduate of Howard University and Seton Hall University School of Law where she has been honored with their alumni awards and has received numerous other awards and honors, including the Margaret Brent Woman of Achievement Award from the ABA and the C. Francis Stradford Award, highest award conferred by the NBA. Brown holds three honorary doctorate degrees.

enna Rae McNeil is Professor Emerita of History at the University of North Carolina in Chapel Hill and a scholar of African-American and U.S. Constitutional history. She is widely known for her American Bar Association prize-winning Groundwork: Charles Hamilton Houston and the Struggle for Civil Rights, recognized as the definitive biography of Houston, Thurgood Marshall's forerunner, law school dean, and mentor. Professor McNeil has served as a visiting professor at Brooklyn College and Howard University School of Law. As Professor of History and Law at Howard, she was honored to be the junior colleague of the inimitable J. Clay Smith, Jr., and she taught jurisprudence as well as constitutional history. As historian of record, she submitted with Professor Smith, Professor Herbert O. Reid, and other law school faculty to the Supreme Court of the United States two amicus curiae briefs in the landmark case of the Regents of the University of California v. Allan Bakke. With particular interest in public history pertaining to African American attorneys, Professor McNeil has served as a consultant to the Damon J. Keith Collection of Wayne State University in Detroit, Michigan and she was the historian of record for "Marching Toward Justice," the inaugural exhibition of the Thurgood Marshall Federal Judiciary Building in Washington, D.C., an exhibit curated by Robert Smith.

Professor McNeil is lead author of Witness: Two Centuries of African American Faith and Practice at the Abyssinian Baptist Church of Harlem, New York, 1808-2008 with co-authors Houston B. Robeson, Quinton Dixie, and Kevin McGruder. She is, as well, co-editor of three volumes: with John Hope Franklin, African Americans and the Living Constitution; with Howard University's Professor Emeritus Michael R. Winston, Historical Judgments Reconsidered and with University of California's Professor Emeritus V. P. Franklin, African Americans and Jews in the Twentieth Century. Her publications also include numerous articles, book chapters and essays. Professor McNeil is currently completing a book-length study of State [of North Carolina] vs. Joan Little and the "free Joan Little" Movement.

Dr. McNeil attended John Muir High School and was graduated from The Westridge School for Girls in Pasadena, California. She is a Phi Beta Kappa graduate of Kalamazoo College in Michigan, and she earned her Master of Arts and Ph.D. degrees in United States and African-American History at the University of Chicago, where her adviser was the eminent John Hope Franklin. She has worked as an archivist at the New York Public Library's Schomburg Center for Research in Black Culture, served as the national Ecumenical Officer and Deputy General Secretary of the American Baptist Churches in the USA (then a multi-racial denomination of more than 1.3 million), and chaired the Howard University Department of History.

Professor McNeil was born in Texas and is one of four children of Jesse Jai McNeil, Sr., Ed.D., formerly a pastor, author, and professor, and of Pearl Lee Walker McNeil, Ph.D., formerly a community activist, ecumenist, professor and author.

Honoring the sacrifices of the ancestors on whose shoulders she stands and following in the vocational footsteps of her educator-parents, Professor McNeil has devoted her life to telling the truths of African American history, doing justice, and working for transformation by encouraging all under her tutelage to be history-makers who, as an ancient proverb states, "plant trees under the shade of which they do not expect to sit."
